Mrs. Van Storch, Widow, 63, and G. R. Collingworth, 65, Get License.

Mrs. Zelia S. Van Storch, widow of Harry Van Storch, a Yonkers jeweler, obtained a license from City Clerk O'Brien in Yonkers yesterday to marry George R. Collingworth, a mechanical engineer, of 82 West 181st Street.

Mrs. Van Storch said she was 63 years old, and Mr. Collingworth said he was two years older. He is a widower.

From Yonkers the aged couple went to the New York City Hall, where they got another license. The wedding is to take place on Nov. 20 at the Episcopal Church of the Intercession, Broadway and 158th Street.
